Public Health Report

Director's Report- Mr. Steve Sikes, Executive Director

Sale of Building at 405 Main St., Hillsboro, MO: A new sign has been placed on the parking lot. The building was shown over the weekend, and we just received notice that there is an additional showing today.

NACCHO 360 Annual Conference "Racing Forward, Swinging Big: United for Public Health's Future": The annual conference was held in Louisville, Kentucky and is the largest convening of local health department leaders and public health professionals in the United States. There were over 800 guest speakers with over 500 sessions focused on a variety of public health topics. Jennifer Shuford, MD, MPH, Deputy Director, and Chief Medical Officer of the CDC presented at the opening session. Former Ohio Governor John Kasich and Former Kentucky governor Steven Beshear held a townhall type session titled "Good Health is Good Governance: Practical Tools for Building Public Health and Local Government Partnerships."

Sharp Increase in Communicable Diseases: Cyclospora Outbreak Update: Currently 50 open cases. Number of new cases being reported has dropped. The CD team is beginning to see new cases drop. Shout out to several staff who stepped up during the Cyclospora outbreak to conduct case investigations.

Several of the reportable diseases have alerts. Alerts represent an increase of at least one standard deviation for total cases in the current year compared to the same time

period in the five previous years. 7 of the 11 reportable enteric diseases have an alert. We also have alerts for animal bites, TB infection, H. Flu, pertussis, and Ehrlichiosis.

January-July 2025 Total CD cases were 469.

January-July 2026 Total CD cases are 1676.

Recognition of Tara Lang, Chestnut Health Systems: Tara Lang, Community Health Navigator II, was recognized as the 2026 Mental Health Champion at the Mental Health Summit. Tara is employed by Chestnut Health Systems but works out of our office connecting patients to community resources and services.

2026 Holiday Schedule Update: Looking at the current holiday schedule, there are a few days we have recognized that we will be closing. The Friday after Thanksgiving November 27th and Christmas Eve December 24th

Discussion of Mental Health Safety Net in Jefferson County (discussion requested by Trustee Brown Taylor, and seconded, at the June 2026 Regular Meeting)

Mr. Taylor highlighted the growing mental health challenges in the community, noting that funding shortages, staffing limitations, insurance barriers, and stigma continue to affect access to care. Information was shared on prevention and early intervention efforts, legal protections related to mental health treatment, and the connection between mental and physical health. The importance of community partnerships, youth support, caregiver resources, and collaborative initiatives such as the Hope Is Here campaign was emphasized. Local organizations were recognized for their ongoing work to improve mental health awareness, treatment access, and crisis support services.

Board of Trustees questions on Program reports

Ms. Stidem asked why the increase in communicable disease cases. Ms. Vidacak replied that some of the increase in Rubella, Measles and Mumps are residents checking for immunity. These are still reported to us but may not be fully investigated. There are two new charts in the Communicable Disease report that show all confirmed and probable cases and one that shows all cases that come to the team.

Ms. Stidem asked if our mosquito spray also kills ticks. Ms. Vidacak replied that the program only targets mosquitos. Ms. Stidem noted that alpha-gal is caused by ticks but not currently counted. Ms. Vidacak responded that all diseases and conditions that are reportable are required under MO 19 CSR 20-20, but Alpha-Gal is not currently on the list. Legislation is currently working to get Alpha-Gal on the reportable list. Ms. Stidem asked if we are testing for Alpha-Gal and if we could offer an update.

Ms. Taylor asked if we have any measles cases and if the reported 2000 cyclosporiasis cases are a real number. Ms. Vidacak responded that at that time we do not have any reported measles cases in the county, but we continue to plan and prepare for one. The current cyclosporiasis response is modeled off our measles response. The state is reporting approximately 2000 cases on their public dashboard.

Mr. Diehl asked if we have a known cause for the cyclosporiasis outbreak. Ms. Vidacak stated that at this time we do not. We can say, anecdotally, that most of the cases seem to be from the first half of July. Many people wait to get tested. Mr. Sikes added that the open cases are not all new cases, but cases we have not been able to close yet.

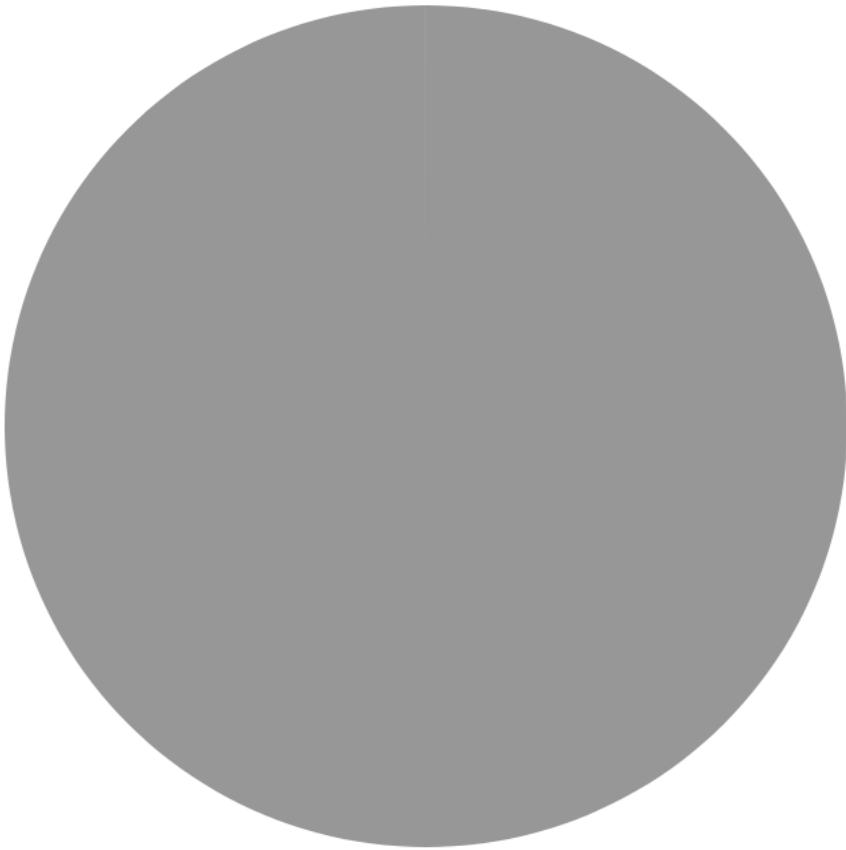

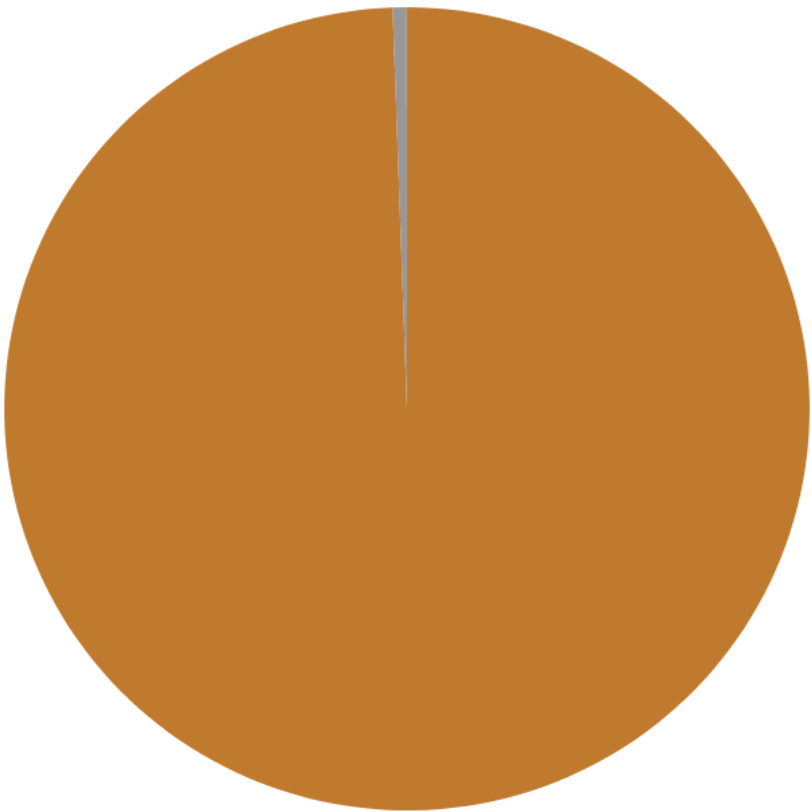

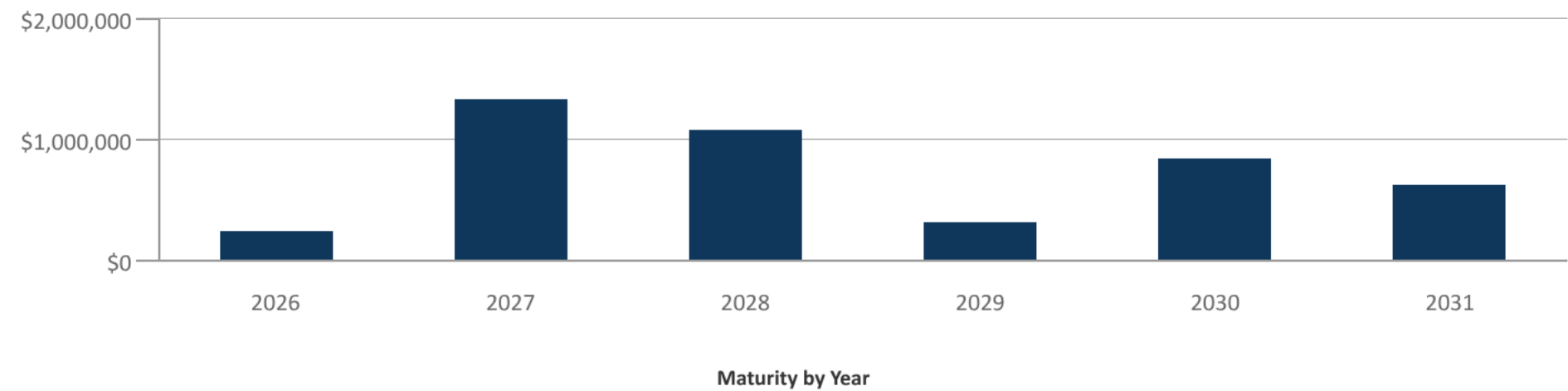

Executive Director's Report JCHD Board of Trustees Meeting August 2026

1. Waste water testing at Missouri High Schools

The Missouri Department of Public Safety is expanding a program that tests wastewater from schools for drugs in Missouri. The pilot program started with 37 schools and will now expand to roughly 150 schools starting mid-September. School selection is randomized, but schools may request expedited testing of their facility. Samples are analyzed for illegal substances, including methamphetamine, cocaine, fentanyl and nitazene. During the pilot testing, nitazene was found in 26 of the 37 schools tested. Nitazene is 70% more potent than fentanyl. Some Jefferson County schools are expected to be part of this program. Although Department of Public Safety is funding this program, the samples are being tested by the Missouri Department of Health & Senior Services.

2. Drive-thru Flu Clinic

Roll Thru and Ghost the Flu Drive Thru Flu Vaccine Clinic is October 2. Clinic will run from 3 pm to 6:30 pm at our Hillsboro office. Go to our website and preregister.

3. Opioid Task Force Update

The task force met on Friday, August 7th. Task force members were given the first round of funding applications to review and score to gauge the strength of each application prior to the meeting. There were 10 requests for a total of \$3,907,525. A funding priority was assigned to each project and will be forwarded to the County Executive and Council for their considerations. Next meeting is November 6, 2026

4. Cyclospora Outbreak

As of September 11, 2026, CDC has declared this outbreak over. However, there continues to be outbreak investigation of Cyclospora infections. The total case count nationally is estimated at 12,833 illnesses in 21 states. FDA is confident that all recalled iceberg lettuce related to this outbreak is off the market. JCHD had approximately 140 case investigations.

5. Alpha Gal Syndrome Update

See report included in board packet. Missouri did enact a new alpha-gal reporting requirement that took effect on August 28, 2026. However, six months was allowed before reporting is required.

6. Presentation at the National Environmental Health Association (NEHA) Conference

Dan Kane, environmental supervisor, and Alicia Donathan, Project, gave a presentation titled "Know the Score: Challenges and Benefits of a Health Inspection Scoring System". The presentation shared JCHD experience and insights on our food inspection program. The NEHA Annual Educational Conference was held in Kansas City in August.

2026 CLINICAL SERVICES BOARD REPORT

August

JCHD clinical services section consists of nursing services including office general clinic and family planning, community clinical services, mobile wellness program, communicable disease testing, Tuberculosis investigations and case management, nutrition services, dental services, and front office services including vital records.

The team is working on adding on a new point of care test for Trichomonas vaginalis. The team has received the test kits and are working on preparing CureMD for the new test and training staff to perform the test. We anticipate offering this in-house test by October 2026.

General Clinic

August was a busy month for immunizations in both offices. The significant increase was due to most schools starting for the 2026-2027 school year mid-August. JCHD provided a total of 691 vaccines in August. The highest volumes of vaccines provided in August include:

The team is also preparing for arrival of respiratory vaccines by placing orders, preparing fee schedules, and reviewing package inserts and clinic documentation for flu, COVID-19, and RSV vaccines.

Mobile Wellness saw 84 patients in August. Only 4 were new to the program.

The mobile team worked with Grandview school district to provide sports physicals for students on August 12, 2026. Physicals were a top services provided in August with 31 total for the month. Upcoming locations for mobile wellness can be found at: jeffcohealth.org/mobile-health-center.

Rabies vaccines were provided to the Jefferson College Veterinarian Technician program. A total of 65 Rabies vaccines were provided on site at Jefferson College to these students.

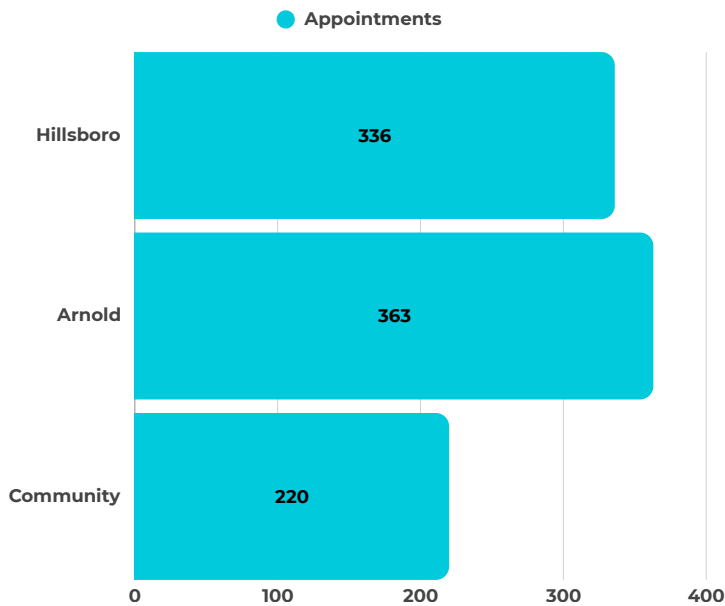

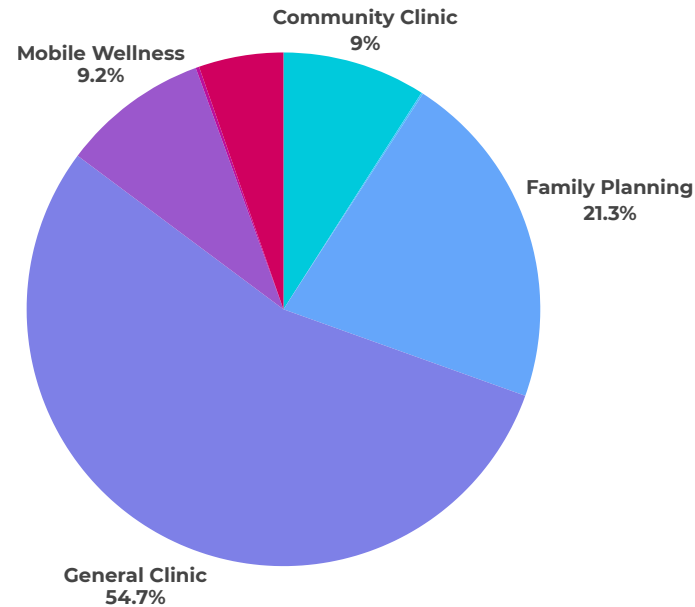

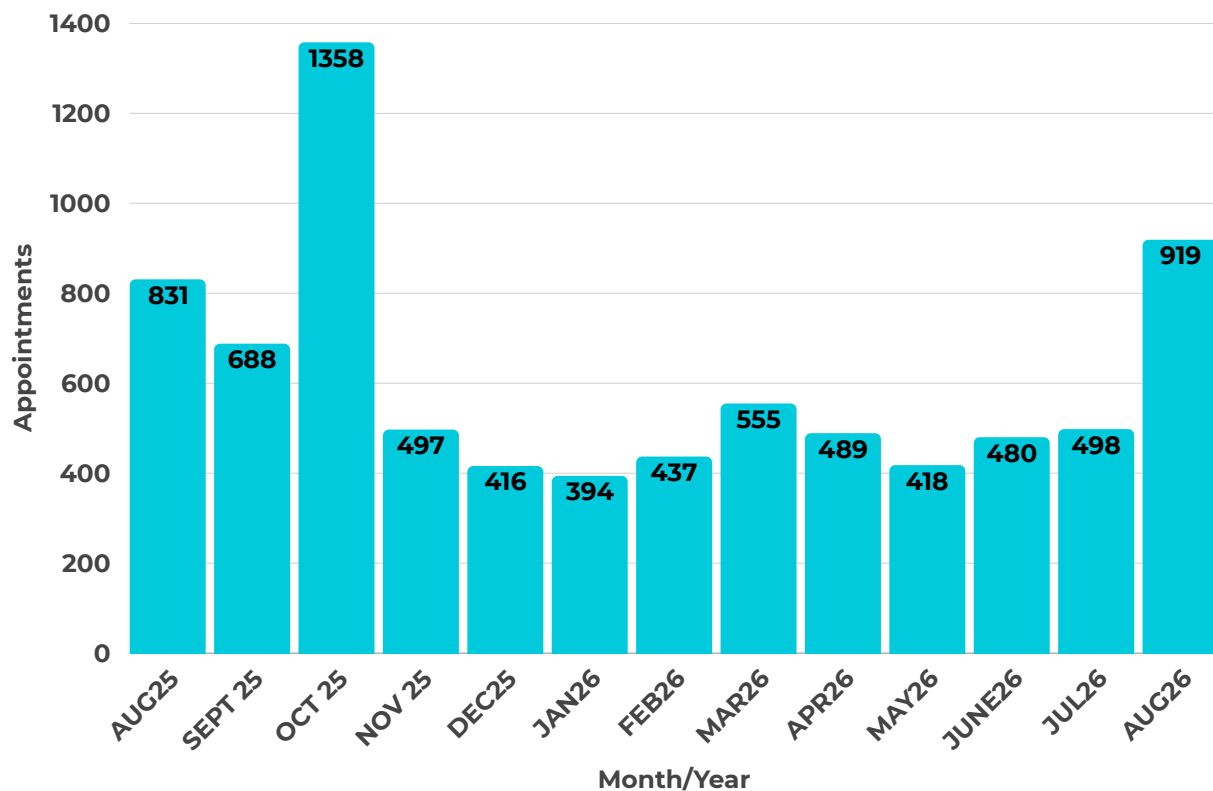
APPOINTMENTS BY LOCATION

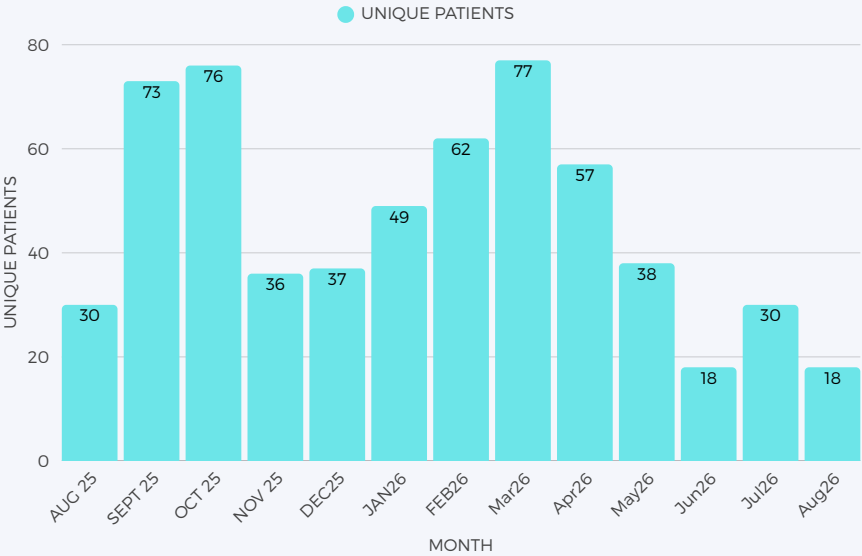

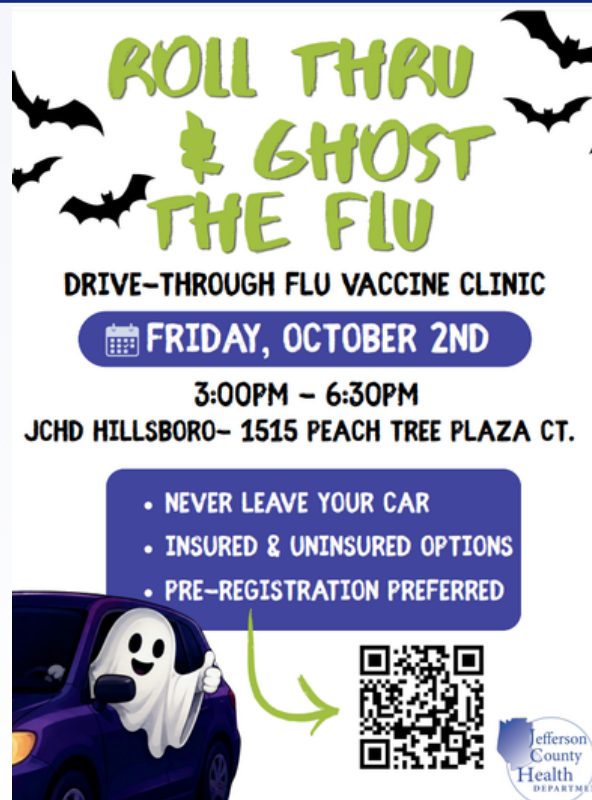

NOTES ON THE DATA:

- All data and information are conditional and may change as more reports are received.
- Case definitions are established by the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services' (DHSS) Communicable Disease Investigation Reference Manual and the CDC's National Notifiable Diseases Surveillance System (NNDSS). The totals reflect the number of confirmed and probable cases reported; suspect cases are not included.
- Data is reported in epidemiologic weeks established by the CDC's Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report (MMWR). The MMWR week starts on a Sunday and ends on Saturday. Values for MMWR week range from 1 to 53, although most years consist of 52 weeks. The 2026 MMWR calendar began on January 4, 2026.
- Case date may be based on the onset date, diagnosis date, specimen date, or test date.
- Excluded from this report are Sexually Transmitted Diseases, Influenza, and COVID-19.
- Jefferson County Health Department monitors all reportable disease cases year-round. Figures 1. and 2. include detailed views of diseases or conditions that may be of importance during the time of year this report is published. Variables such as outbreaks or the seasonality of communicable diseases may affect the number of cases per month and call for a more in-depth look. Seasonal change in the incidence of infectious diseases is common.

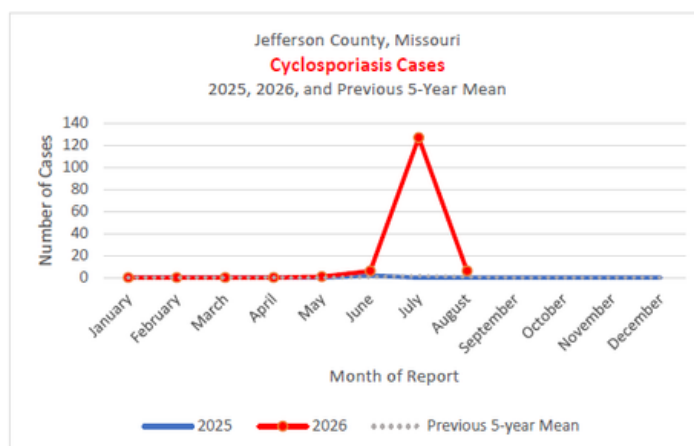

Cyclosporiasis

Cyclospora (Cyclospora cayetanensis) is a microscopic parasite that infects the small intestine and causes a gastrointestinal illness called cyclosporiasis. Cyclosporiasis is spread by exposure to contaminated feces. Exposure may be via waterborne transmission (drinking or swimming in contaminated water) or foodborne transmission (eating contaminated fresh fruits and vegetables). Cyclospora needs time (typically, at least 1–2 weeks) after being passed in a bowel movement to become infectious for another person. Therefore, direct person-to-person transmission is unlikely. People living or traveling in tropical or subtropical regions of the world may be at increased risk for infection because Cyclosporiasis is endemic in certain countries. Cyclosporiasis is a self-limiting illness, but symptoms can last for weeks. In untreated cases, relapse is common. Individuals who are immunocompromised may experience a prolonged illness. Trimethoprim-sulfamethoxazole (TMP-SMX) is the antibiotic treatment of choice for cyclosporiasis.

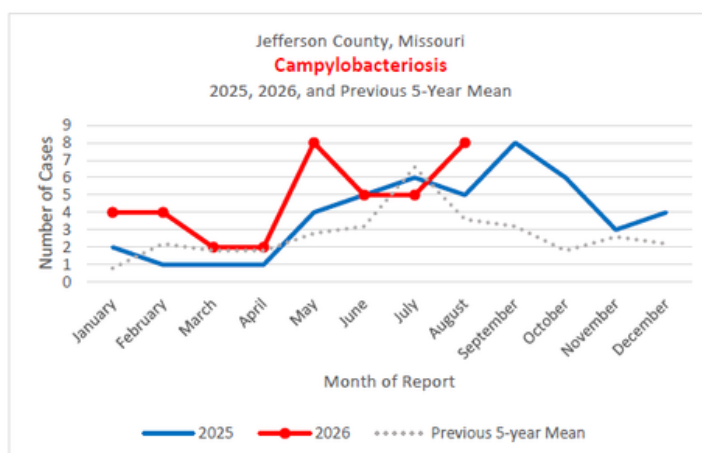
There were 6 cases of Cyclosporiasis reported during August 2026 in Jefferson County. During the previous 5 years, the number of reported cases has ranged from 0 to 3 per month. A year-to-date alert has been noted for Cyclosporiasis. Year-to-date alerts are present when the total cases in the current year are more than one standard deviation above the mean for the same time period in the previous five years. As of September 11, 2026, the CDC has declared the multistate outbreak of cyclosporiasis over. There has been a significant decline in recent infections and the best-by dates for all products linked to this outbreak have passed and the contaminated products are no longer available in stores or restaurants.



Campylobacteriosis

Campylobacter infection, or campylobacteriosis, is caused by Campylobacter bacteria. Campylobacteriosis is one of the most common causes of diarrheal illness in the United States. There are 21 Campylobacter species; however, Campylobacter jejuni and Campylobacter coli are the two species that most often infect humans. Almost all persons infected with Campylobacter recover without any specific treatment. Antimicrobial therapy is warranted only for patients with severe disease or those at high risk for severe disease, such as those with immune systems severely weakened from medications or other illnesses.

There were 8 cases of Campylobacteriosis reported during August 2026 in Jefferson County. During the previous 5 years, the number of cases has ranged from 0 to 8 per month. A year-to-date alert has been noted for Campylobacteriosis. Year-to-date alerts are present when the total cases in the current year are more than one standard deviation above the mean for the same time period in the previous five years.

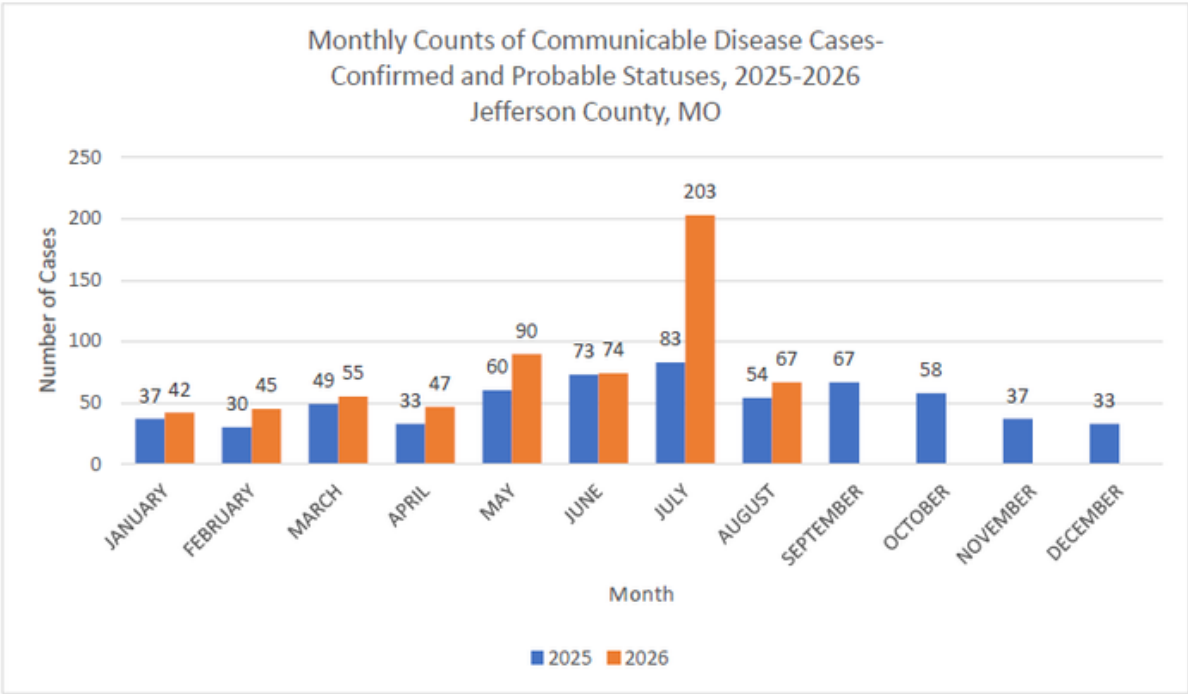
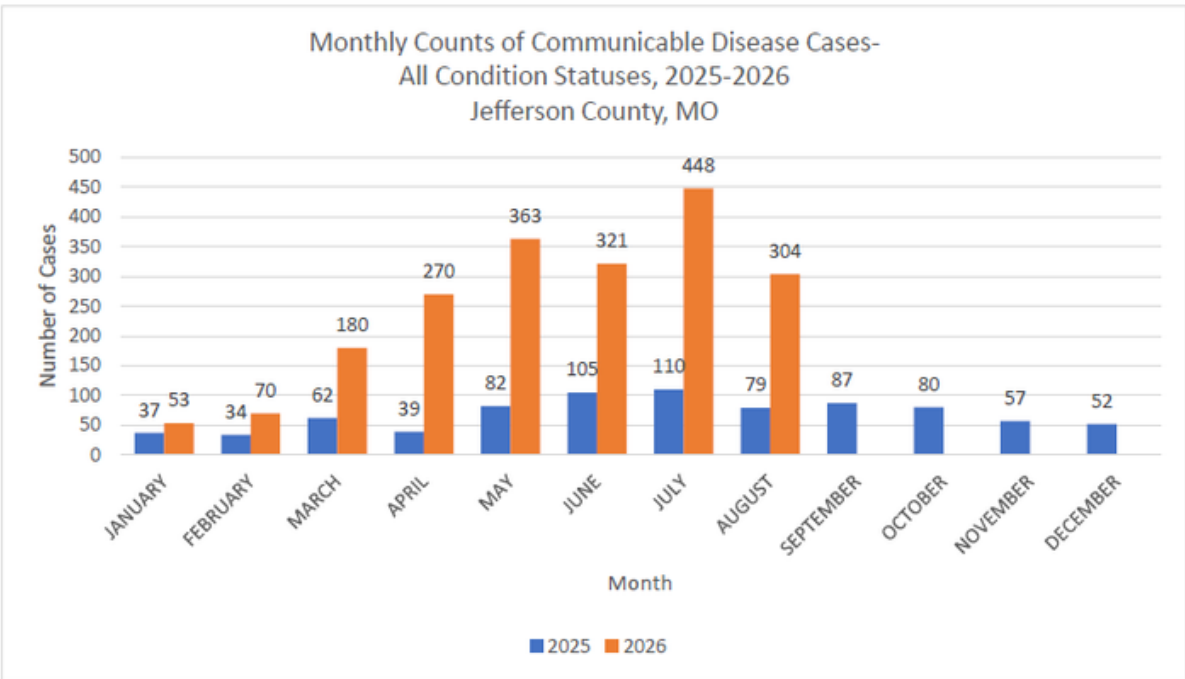


Table 6: Total Communicable Disease Case Investigations by Month 2025-2026

Alpha-Gal Syndrome (AGS) Update

Summary

Alpha-gal syndrome (AGS) is a potentially serious allergy to sugar found in most non-primate mammals and products made from them. In the United States, the condition is associated primarily with tick bites. Diagnosis requires both a compatible clinical history and a blood test for alpha-gal-specific IgE; a positive test alone does not establish active disease. Prevention centers on avoiding tick bites, and people with a confirmed diagnosis should follow an individualized avoidance and emergency-care plan developed with a healthcare provider.

How do humans get AGS?

1. The Tick Preys on Mammals.

Ticks pick up the alpha-gal molecule by feeding on local wildlife, such as deer, mice, or raccoons. The molecule becomes a part of the tick's digestive system and salivary glands.

2. The Tick Bites a Human.

When a local tick attaches to a human, it injects its saliva into the person's bloodstream while feeding. This transfers the alpha-gal sugar directly into the human body.

3. The Immune System Misidentifies the Threat.

Because humans lack this sugar molecule, the immune system views it as a dangerous foreign invader. In some individuals, the body creates a high volume of IgE antibodies specifically designed to attack alpha-gal.

4. The "Red Meat" Allergy is Born

Once these antibodies are created, the person is sensitized. Weeks or months down the road, if they consume mammalian products (like beef, pork, lamb, or dairy), the body recognizes the alpha-gal sugar in the food and unleashes an allergic reaction.

How is AGS diagnosed?

The Blood Draw: A healthcare provider draws a simple sample of your blood. No fasting is required before the test.

What It Measures: The lab looks for immunoglobulin-E (IgE) antibodies specific to galactose-alpha-1,3-galactose (alpha-gal), the sugar molecule transmitted by tick bites.

Interpreting Results: An alpha-gal IgE level of 0.1 kU/L or greater is generally considered positive and, when paired with a matching clinical history, confirms the diagnosis.

Getting the Test: You can get a doctor's order through an allergist or primary care provider. Testing is performed at a commercial laboratory such as Quest or Lab Corp. The Missouri State Public Health Laboratory does not offer testing.

JCHD does not currently offer diagnostic testing for AGS: a physician order is required that must include the clinical picture and symptoms evaluated by a physician, and often an specialist such as an allergist.

Why Clinical History Matters:

A positive blood test alone does not formally diagnose alpha-gal syndrome because some people carry antibodies without having active clinical allergies.

Doctors diagnose AGS by combining your blood test results with your medical history—specifically looking for delayed allergic reactions (usually 3 to 6 hours) after eating red meat or mammalian products, alongside a history of tick bites.

Symptoms can include hives, rash, nausea or vomiting, stomach pain, swelling of lips or eye lips occurring 2-6 hours after eating meat or dairy. May not have a reaction after every alpha gal exposure.

Is AGS a reportable condition in the state of Missouri?

Yes, Missouri enacted a new alpha-gal reporting law through [House Bill 2372](#), signed by [Governor Mike Kehoe](#) on July 13, 2026. It took effect on August 28, 2026, and amended [RSMo § 192.020](#).

Key requirements:

Alpha-gal syndrome is included on list of conditions reportable to the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services.

The laboratory generating the result—not the patient or local health department—must report an alpha-gal IgE blood-test result that meets the sensitization level established by the current national case definition.

The report must be submitted within seven days through an electronic laboratory reporting system.

Reporting must begin no later than February 28, 2027, six months after the law's effective date.

How to protect yourself?

Prevent tick bites: For people with a diagnosis, additional tick bites may increase the risk.

Know where ticks live: Ticks can be found in grassy, brushy, or wooded areas. They can also be found in your yard or neighborhood and can also be carried to us by our pets or livestock.

What to wear: Wear light colored clothing and tuck your pant legs into your socks. When you get home place your cloths in the dryer on high heat to kill any ticks that may be on your clothing.

Insect Repellent:

- Permethrin can be sprayed on clothing and gear to repel ticks
- Use EPA approved sprays directly on your skin, be sure to follow all label instructions
- DEET, Picaridin, Oil of Lemon Eucalyptus, or any other EPA approved product that fit your needs

Check yourself for ticks: When you come in from outside, check your body for ticks and remove them immediately.

Check your pets for ticks: When your pet comes in from outside, check them for ticks and remove the tick immediately.

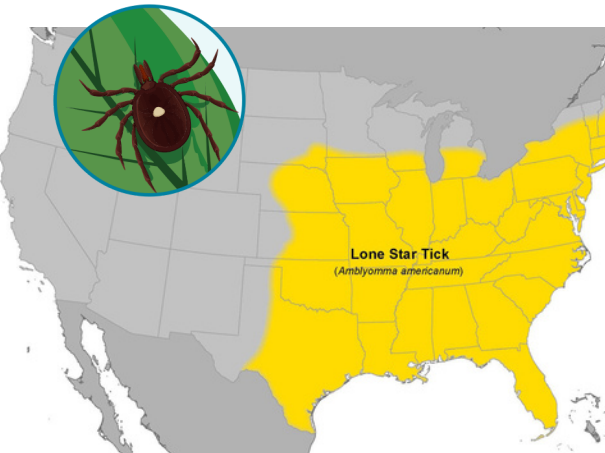

Supporting Patients with Alpha-gal Syndrome (AGS)

AGS, sometimes called red meat allergy, is a serious, potentially life-threatening allergy to a carbohydrate known as alpha-gal (galactose- α -1,3-galactose). Patients can manage AGS with the help of their healthcare provider.

CDC estimated in 2023 that as many as 450,000 people in the United States may be affected by AGS. For some patients, diagnosis can take years after the onset of symptoms, but this delay may be decreasing as awareness improves. Healthcare providers who serve patients in areas with lone star ticks should know how to recognize the symptoms of and test for AGS to provide a timely diagnosis for patients.



In the United States, the lone star tick is widely distributed in the Northeast, South, and Midwest.

AGS is caused most commonly by tick bites, especially lone star tick bites in the United States. When a tick bites, it can transfer alpha-gal from its saliva into a person's blood. This can result in a person's immune system creating antibodies against alpha-gal. This can trigger an allergic reaction the next time a person is exposed to alpha-gal containing foods or products.

Alpha-gal is found in:



Meat of mammals, e.g., beef, pork, mutton/lamb, venison, and game meat



Animal milk (dairy) products



Gelatin and other food and medication ingredients derived from mammals

Recognize Signs & Symptoms

- **Delayed reaction:** It can take weeks or months after a tick bite to start seeing symptoms. When symptoms do start, they usually appear 2-6 hours after eating red meat or dairy products.
- **Varying symptoms:** AGS symptoms can range from mild to severe, and some may be life-threatening. People with AGS might not react to every product containing alpha-gal, and some people can experience different symptoms or reactions each time they are exposed to alpha-gal, even when it is the same product.

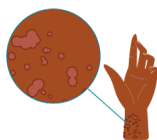
Symptoms can include:



Gastrointestinal

Some patients only have gastrointestinal symptoms

- Heartburn
- Nausea
- Diarrhea
- Abdominal pain



Skin or mucous membrane

- Urticaria (hives)
- Angioedema



Respiratory

- Cough
- Wheeze
- Difficulty breathing



Cardiovascular

- Hypotension: dizziness and syncope



Anaphylaxis

Requires emergency care





Know When to Consider AGS

AGS is diagnosed through a detailed patient history, physical examination, and a blood test. Consider AGS when your patient:

- Experiences symptoms and lives in or recently visited an area with lone star ticks, reports tick bites, or spends time outdoors
- Reports waking up in the middle of the night with symptoms
- Has anaphylaxis of unknown cause, or recurrent, unexplained allergic reactions that cannot be linked to other allergens
- Acquires an adult-onset allergy
- Has a positive alpha-gal IgE blood test in addition to the above experiences (a positive test alone does not confirm AGS)

Help Your Patients Manage AGS

Work with your patients to:

- Identify and avoid products containing alpha-gal, including red meat or dairy
- Determine the need for epinephrine (e.g. auto-injector, nasal spray)

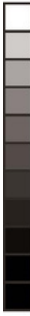
You can also consider referring them to an allergist. Over time, some patients may be able to tolerate exposure to products containing alpha-gal again. If symptoms do not resolve 1-2 months after removing red meat from their diet, ensure all alpha-gal has been eliminated from their diet and consider other diagnoses and referral to an allergist or other specialist.

Encourage patients to:

- Seek emergency care if experiencing severe reactions
- Schedule a follow-up appointment 1-2 months after diagnosis to reassess
- Educate themselves on what products contain alpha-gal
- Read food product labels carefully to avoid products that contain alpha-gal
- Prevent tick bites because new tick bites may reactivate reactions to alpha-gal

Alpha-gal may also be found in **milk** and **other dairy products**, **gelatin** made from beef or pork, **meat broth**, and **mammal fat**, like lard, tallow, or suet.

Alpha-gal is **NOT found in poultry**, such as chicken, turkey, duck, or quail; **fish and seafood**, such as shrimp; or eggs.

Alpha-Gal Syndrome (AGS)



Symptoms commonly appear 2-6 hours after a person with AGS is in contact with products containing alpha-gal, like red meat, dairy, and some medications.

AGS symptoms can include:

- Hives or itchy rash
- Swelling of the lips, throat, tongue, or eyelids
- Nausea, vomiting, or diarrhea
- Heartburn or indigestion
- Cough, shortness of breath, or difficulty breathing
- Dizziness, faintness, or drop in blood pressure
- A combination of symptoms referred to as anaphylaxis

Facts on Alpha-gal Syndrome



AGS is a serious, potentially life-threatening allergy and tickborne disease. You may know it as "red meat allergy" or "tick bite meat allergy."



People with AGS can have a serious allergic response, such as difficulty breathing or anaphylaxis, after eating red meat or other products that contain alpha-gal.



You can develop AGS after being bitten by some types of ticks, primarily the lone star tick in the United States.

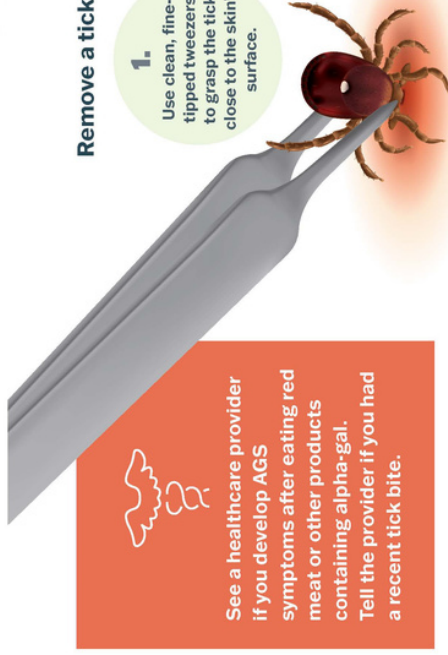
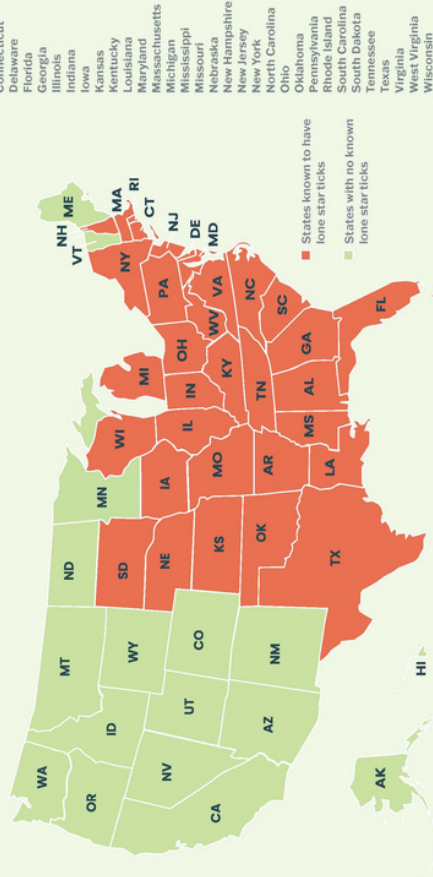


Hunters have a heightened risk of developing AGS because of increased time spent outdoors, including walking through thick grass, being low to the ground, and spending time in densely wooded areas where ticks live. It is important hunters know about allergic responses that can occur when someone with AGS eats red meat.



Not every person bitten by a lone star tick will develop AGS, and it can take weeks to months for a person to have symptoms after being bitten.

States with established lone star tick populations



Remove a tick as soon as possible

1.

Use clean, fine-tipped tweezers to grasp the tick close to the skin's surface.

2.

Pull upward with steady, even pressure. Don't twist or jerk the tick.

3.

Thoroughly clean the bite area with rubbing alcohol or soap and water.

How to prevent AGS

Preventing tick bites is the best way to protect yourself from developing AGS. Remember, ticks don't only bite in the summer. They can be active in the fall and on warmer winter days.

BEFORE YOU GO OUTDOORS TO HUNT:

- Use Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)-registered insect repellent.
- Treat clothing and gear with 0.5% permethrin. Follow product instructions.
- Use a tick preventive product on your dog.

AFTER YOU COME INDOORS:

- Examine clothing, hunting gear, and pets for ticks.
- Shower and perform a thorough tick check. If you find a tick, remove it as soon as possible.

 - This table shows the amount of confirmed and probable cases the team investigated compared to each month last year. These are the “counted” cases.
- Table 6: Number of Other/Miscellaneous Cases by Month, Jefferson County, MO
 - This table shows ALL incoming cases each month compared to the previous year. These are reports of diseases/conditions that must be investigated, and upon investigation determine their confirmation status. This table provides a better illustration of the team's overall workload.
 - July 2026 numbers include the following No Case and/or Titer results: 126 Rubella, 55 Measles and 19 Mumps. These could be from residents checking their antibodies/immunity to a disease.
- Weekly Respiratory Reports will begin next month. The CDC respiratory season officially begins in October.

2026 Mosquito Control and Surveillance Season

The 2026 Mosquito Control and Surveillance Season began on May 23, 2026.

- The program had two unpaid internships that assisted with surveillance trapping and testing beginning June 1, 2026, both interns have returned to school.
- As of September 11, 2026, 3949 mosquitoes have been collected through surveillance trapping.
- As of September 11, 2026, the following trap sites tested positive for West Nile Virus: Arnold, Crystal City, De Soto, Herculaneum, High Ridge, Hillsboro, House Springs, Imperial and Pevely.

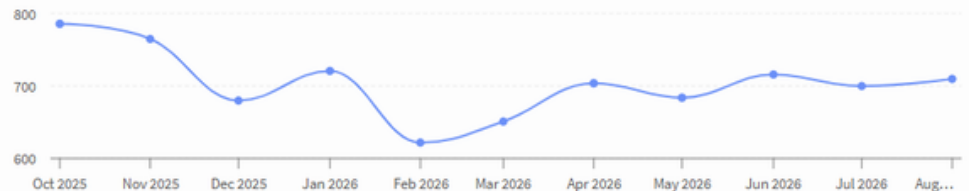

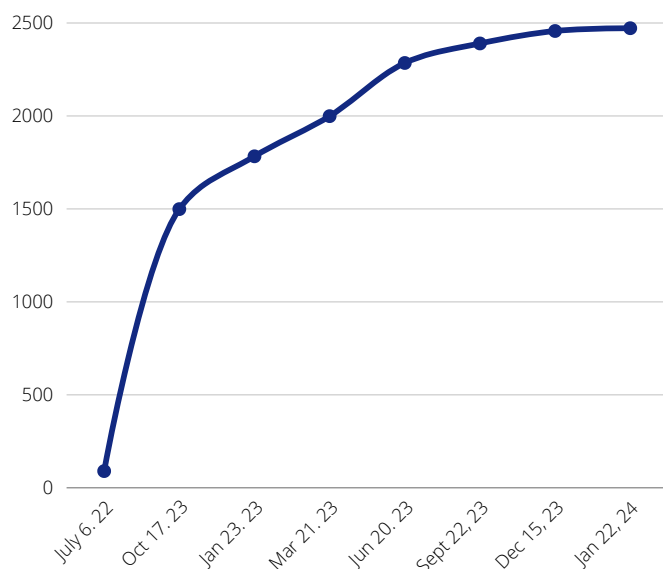
